Katleho Mothae carped the diem


Our talented young and upcoming pianist, percussionist, conductor, and music educator, Katleho Mothae accepted the opportunity offered by the Associated Board of the Royal Schools of Music's new cultural arm for emerging young artists in southern Africa, Bridging Events, to participate in a concert tour to the Eastern and Western Cape from 9 to 14 September. He achieved the highest marks in 2021 for his ABRSM ARSM (Associate of the Royal Schools of Music) piano performance exam in South Africa, which secured his invitation.

The mini tour included performances at the Rhodes University in Makhanda, Gqebertha and Knysna. He performed works of Haydn, Brahms, Fauré and Malkolm, and teamed up with two other 2021 high scorers, Matthew Perry (saxophone) and Tiaan Uys (saxophone). They formed an ad hoc trio and ended their Resonating Classics concert programme every evening with the 'high octane' work by Astor Piazolla, Libertango.

Katleho started at Ladybird International Arts with music lessons at the age of 8. His career included travelling and performing with the international icon Tshepo Tshola. He is currently busy with his ABRSM Diploma in Music and thereafter aspire to study BMus at a university of his choice.

Ladybird offers a wide range of arts programmes for prospective learners to choose from according to their personal interests. Themes for their performances should also be their own choice and interest, advises Daniël Bezuidenhout.



Daniël Bezuidenhout **Creative and innovative programs** Themes that capture

The Dramatic Arts exam candidates are required to construct a themed program. This can be on any topic or motive that they find interesting. Each grade has specific requirements as to the number of pieces – or skills – needed in a programme. There are two avenues to take when constructing your programme. The first is the collect all the pieces and then formulate a theme, based on the pieces you have collected. This is sometimes the easier route to follow, as you work from what you have. The other route is to pick a theme or motive and find pieces that fit into it. This avenue is a bit harder, but can be more fruitful, because you are to read through a lot of material to find the piece or pieces that are a suitable fit for the topic.

The Ladybird Dramatic Arts department has, for the past four years, worked on examinations that require candidates to construct programmes on themes of their choice. Students always find this journey exhilarating. Some students choose to select a theme that challenges them in terms of the various materials required. Their choices of interest embraced singing, instrumental performance, movement and even painting. There have also been students who have chosen topics that they otherwise would not have explored.

The contents of a programme are not limited to written pieces, such as poems and proses. A candidate may choose any piece that can be seen as a performance skill. This means that a candidate may also sing or play an instrument; paint on stage or even have a dance sequence as a component on their programme. The most important thing is, that there should be a golden thread running throughout.

Themed programmes are beneficial to students of any arts course (music, photography, art, graphic design, creative writing, etc.), as it provides them with a lens from which to work. Another benefit is that a programme supports students to understand how bigger productions work. From this, a candidate, then, should be able to construct a showcase on a bigger scale. A last benefit is that a student has a programme they can present for an audition.

Students' creative writing skills also benefit from compilating their own programmes as they are to write the links and arrange the content suitably. The flow of ideas and content is important. This is usually a big task for students. However, it is a most enjoyable component.

Lastly, a programme evolves with the performer, and so do the topics. Looking forward to seeing the next round of programmes offered by all the Ladybird performers and visual artists.

> Researching and choosing themes for programmes should aim to have a golden thread running throughout.

Sewing with Sylvia


Health-benefits of sewing

Evoking nature The Wonderful World of Insects

During the past term we made use of insects as prompts for our creations. Students each brought an image of their favorite insect to class to use as a reference or starting point for their artworks. For the students to get to know the insect they chose, and focus on the detail, we started with a line drawing using markers and then colored the drawing using paint washes. 


Why on A? Orchestral tuning 'mystery' revealed

Ever wondered why orchestral instruments always tune on an A? I was pondering on this and decided to do some research and find out why. And after some asking around, I realized that more of the students don't know the reason. Do you?

Continue reading if you like to know why we tune orchestral instruments on an A!

One logical reason for orchestras tuning on an A is because every string instrument has an A! The standard pitch is A=440 Hertz (this is 440 vibrations per second). This is the A string on string instruments, the A above middle C. It is the pitch used to ensure instruments are in tune with themselves and each other!

Some orchestras tune on a little higher pitch, like 442 Hertz, some believe that this results in a brighter sound. However, this is a personal opinion.



The oboist plays it to prime orchestra concerts. Pitch pipes and tuning forks are adjusted to it. It's a factory preset for electronic keyboards and tuners. It's everywhere! How did that come about? I still wonder...

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



